“Footprints in the Sand”

Celebration of life in Destin
Past, Present, and Future

Our first order of 32 pavers were delivered September 21! There are fifteen 12X12 pavers commemorating the first families from 1835 to 1935. Each of these pavers feature the family name and the footprints symbol. These early family names are: Destin, Marler, Melvin, Jones, Woodward, Shirah, Maltezo, Brunson, Taylor, Calhoun, Kelly, Walter, O’Neal, Chambliss, and Wells. An additional 17 pavers have been delivered purchased by local families and businesses. Installation was completed December 13th. Additional 4X8 or 8X8 pavers may be purchased to honor a family member, special event, business, charter boat, or organization. You can pick up a paver order form at the Museum, download one from our website, or order online at www.bricksrus.com/order/destinhistoryandfishing. 4X8 pavers are \$75 and 8X8 pavers are \$150. Color choices are red, red/tan, or sandstone.

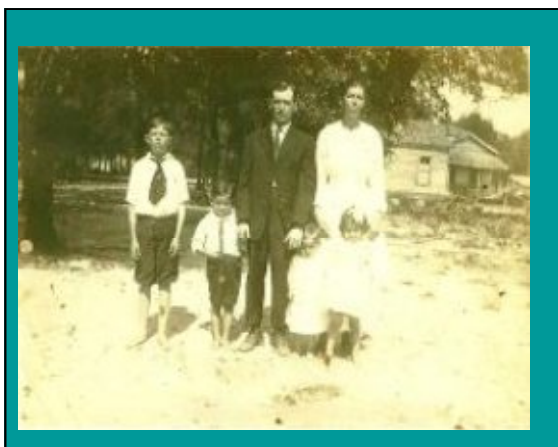
The Brunson Family

Lorenzo Dow Brunson and Sarah Etta Brown brought their family by boat from Portland, Florida to Destin in 1927. Their children were Jesse Eldon "Cobby" (1908-1988), Thomas Reddin "Salty" (1913-2011), Kathleen (1915-2009), John Dow "JD" (1918-1970), Zachary "Zach" (1921-2000), Roy Renzel (1922-1924), and Mabel Brunson (1924-1977). The Brunson sons joined the Destin Fishing Fleet as Captains and all the girls married boat captains. The men of these families came to fish with Leonard Destin, Jr. It was not long until almost all of them had built themselves a boat to harvest the abundance of fish the local waters offered.

Lorenzo was born June 19, 1883 in Alabama. He was the oldest of seven children of parents Thomas M. Brunson (1855– 8 July 1906) and Emily Louise Thomas (1868-?). His wife Sarah was born in Florida August 17, 1886. Sarah was one of eleven children of John Reddin Brown (25 June 1853-18 November 1923) and Catherine Howard (18 October 1852-18 August 1920) who were married January 12, 1871 in Pensacola, Florida.

Cobby married Madeline Marler (16 August 1902-5 September 1986) in 1922. Reddin married Gladys Parrish in 1933. Kathleen married Roscoe Mikel (9 August 1916-3 January 1989). JD married Winnie Odell Chambless (8 March 1918-30 December 2003) in 1944. Zachary married Mary Chambless (born abt. 1924) in 1942. Mabel married Jesse Elmer Broxson (28 October 1921-5 December 1981) in 1940.



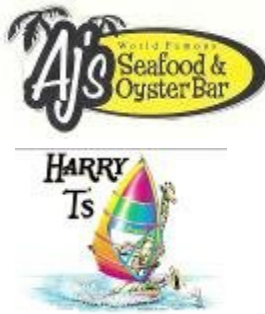

Museum Benefits During the Destin Seafood Festival

The museum was busy during the Destin Seafood Festival held September 30, October 1st and 2nd. This year's Seafood Festival was a huge success for all of Destin. An estimated 51,000 came out to enjoy this festival. The museum had a fundraiser including a parking concession and booth.

Alan Laird of AJ's Seafood and Oyster Bar donated the use of his parking lot for the museum to use for a parking concession. A \$5 per car charge gave visitors to the festival a free coupon for museum admission and a \$5 coupon for AJ's Restaurant. Volunteers manned the parking area to collect money and pass out coupons.

Dan Empson of Harry T's Restaurant donated his cooking staff and food products to sell Fish Tacos and Sweet Potato Fries in the museum booth down on the docks during the festival. More wonderful volunteers made a great fundraiser!

This fundraiser brought \$ 9,057 to the museum!



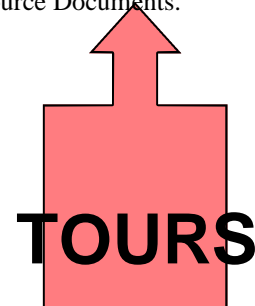
Mayflower Tours out of Illinois brought winter visitors to the museum October 24th, 31st and November 14th. They have 21 tour dates set up for 2012.

Off site talks are getting the word out about Destin and its history. Cast Net Fishing Helped Feed Early Families

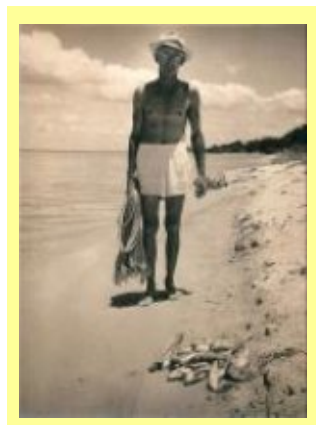
Destin's fishing history begins in 1835 with Leonard Destin. Leonard made his first fishing nets by hand and fished with them from the tender (lifeboat) off his sailboat. The original fishermen in Destin began fishing with a larger net known as a seine. Webbing for the seine was hand made much the way a cast net was created. Cotton yarn was used, knitted and tied, using a wooden net needle.

From the time they were young, children of Destin were taught by their elders how to tie a net. Learning to fish with the net was also on the list of requirements. Fishing for mullet was very popular since it was a local favorite food fish. Seeing who could spread the net the largest was always a challenge.

Willie Mae Taylor was a 3rd generation Marler of Destin. Her father was William Thomas Marler, better known as "Uncle Billy" and who the Destin Bridge is named in honor. Her mother was Camela Katherine Brooks. Willie Mae's grandparents were William Elisha Marler and Sarah Rotincia Lancaster who came into this area after the Civil War. Willie Mae married Clement James Garfield Taylor and lived her life here in Destin. She was a gracious lady and dedicated her life to the community and the preservation of Destin's heritage. The picture of Willie Mae was taken by Ladie Penick in 1957 here in Destin while she was admiring a cast net made by her father. This is one of the museum's favorite photos with its simple artistic format it has a timeless and elegant look.
